Diversity, Equality and Inclusivity

Inclusion involves bringing together and harnessing diverse persons and resources in a way that is beneficial. Inclusion puts the concept and practice of diversity into action by creating an environment of involvement, respect, and connection—where the richness of ideas, backgrounds, and perspectives are harnessed to create community value.

It was found at the end of November 2019, that the majority of technicians in managerial positions are male, even in subject disciplines where the majority of technicians are female,



The University of Nottingham report – Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI): A Technician lens was presented last year at STEMM-CHANGE conference & recommended more promotion opportunities for female technicians.



According to the EDI research, just 10% of technicians are black, Asian and minority

ethnic (BAME). Many technical staff were unaware of the issues in the workforce and of the Athena SWAN and Race Equality Charter initiatives, the report concluded.

The IST work hard especially with the Science Council to promote DEI and to that end Kevin Oxley, **IST Diversity & Equality Champion** is looking at improving the way we can promote and ensure equality, inclusion and diversity as a professional body to support our members.

At our Conferences we have started to ensure that delegates can identify key themes for each workshop and for this we have included a supporting individuals/inclusivity theme. We ensure every delegate has the opportunity to attend at least one of these workshops.

Evolution of the Journal & IST Logo

65 years of the Journal and logo design inspiration

Over the years, the IST has adapted to meet the demands of the technical community. Its design has also made an evolutionary journey. Now that we are engaging more with other sectors, including creative industries professionals, we will be looking at the design of the Journal and other publications to move them onto a new look.



The design of the Journal from its inception in 1955. The Journal has taken many forms over the years. There is a short period of 8 years where there was no Journal, but the IST did have other methods of communication at the time, including the Bulletin. The logo has changed as well as the size of the Journal.

The Journal has always been an important way of keeping our members & technicians involved whilst offering the opportunity for members to dabble in publishing. For some publishing technical staff articles is not something that is easily or readily accessible to them in the research world, whereas some technicians have as as 20 much publications in several journals.

I think that the IST's journal has changed and evolved very much in the same way that the IST has, and science and technology in general does - a hop, skip, and a jump. But not necessarily in that order!

It's change over the years has been a reflection of how the IST has itself changed and evolved. And it is ready for the next jump I think, where it can change to embrace how we all are now communicating online, on the move, constantly interacting, and importantly from anywhere.

Our members in the last IST survey mentioned that they enjoy receiving the Journal, but others have said in an ever changing 'environment ecoaware world', the eNewsletter has played a key role in being an environmentally friendly communications bulletin to supplement the Journal.



As you can see from the Journal transformation above, the logo itself has also changed its look over the years. It is interesting to see how this has changed from its inception. The original logo clearly shows the tradition of heraldry, in the coat of arms which may have been inspired as this design is typically associated with many university logos, like Lancaster University's logo for instance. These traditional designs are still used in modern looks today, such as the Tesla motors logo. The next logo designed in the 70s mimics a similar look to that of its period, perhaps embodying the inspiration from designs similar to the shoe brand VANS, some features of the design are still seen today in some of the most influential brands in the world.

Our current logos identity uses the 'three strands or divisions' (like seen in the box below) from the coat of arms to strikethrough the I, S and T which may have been used to give the logo a unique look but instead of keeping the crest, it retains the field divisions which signifies the importance of 'strength in together'. The lower case **i** has been kept to give the logo character and the blue colours may have been taken from the original colours of the institute. Our current logo, in some way resembles a design not too dissimilar to the digital design period, perhaps something similar to the look of Google. What do you think?



We are always thinking about new ideas along with how we can better communicate with all members, and a lot of what we carry out has been informed along the way by what our members want.

As the IST Publications take the next steps of the journey, we have decided that we will update the look of the Journal. Some members are from technology/media rather than science backgrounds and we have been told the design fits very well with a science or engineering community. However, to a graphic designer or IT specialist, the look 'does not appeal as greatly to the technical staff in our areas.'

We know that the Journal is enjoyed by many

members, therefore we wouldn't want to change it too much. However, we do realise that we need to take everyone's opinions into account. Therefore we have decided for the 2021 Journal, we will design a new look - the Journal will remain similar to its roots both on design and contents, but it will undertake a brand new look and we will be asking members what content they would like in the Journal and other publications going forward.

We are looking into a transformation of the eNewsletter at the same time. We would like this to be closer to the Journal, which will act as a supplement. As these changes are going on, we would welcome your suggestions, as well as your feedback.

A Personal View on CPD

This is likely to be the last CPD corner that I write and I thought it might be a good time to reflect on some of my own CPD. Of course, for most of my working life, CPD hadn't been invented but there were always development activities. I have identified the two activities that made the greatest impression on me.

Number.

Glassworking Techniques

This was a 4-day course offered by Braintree FE College. It was hands-on in a small workshop, using oxygen blowtorches and there were about 6 of us. When making the case to attend, I emphasised the cost benefits of being able to repair broken glassware and to create simple components, e.g. delivery tubes, instead of buying them. And I really wanted to go! And it was brilliant. However, as a lab technician in a chemistry lab it was not always easy to find the time, without interruptions, to use and practice the skills and I was never able to make full use of the training. But I still have total admiration for glassworkers.

Biosecurity for Counter-Terrorism

This was the topic for a 45 minute workshop at the S-lab conference in 2014. I was a self-employed health and safety consultant, specialising in chemical safety, and as the threat from terrorism was something I knew nothing about, it seemed a good opportunity to learn. It was hosted by someone from the National Counter Terrorism Security Office (NaCTSO) and she opened my eyes to a whole world that I never knew existed! When I got home I researched NaCTSO, contacted my regional Counter-Terrorism Security Adviser and we had a meeting. She outlined her activities and showed the video that had been made to highlight security aspects of chemical security in universities. So how did other people benefit from my CPD? The IST's Technical Conference 2015, held in Leeds, had a workshop led by one of Yorkshire's Counter-Terrorism Security Advisers.

I have always believed that CPD is not just about work but also includes personal development. It can involve learning about the way the world works both on the large scale and the immediate microcosm that is the workplace, how to interact with people and, sometimes, how to manipulate circumstances to achieve a target. I also believe that CPD is personal. Each individual has different strengths and weakness, maybe a planned career pathway, specific interests and variable access to CPD. And sometimes the unexpected cause a change of direction. Therefore, we each have to cut our coats according to our cloth, as they say.

In my experience, the key element for any CPD activity to be most effective is enthusiasm. If you enjoy what you are doing, you will gain more from it than if you treat it as a necessary evil.

Double Fellowship Awarded

Mohamed El-Guindy has been granted a Fellowship of the Royal Society of Arts (FRSA) for his contribution to the society in the research related to Media and Information literacy for UNESCO projects; in addition to his contribution to the Arabic Media Sphere on raising awareness of critical issues related to the digital world via his TV show "Tech Talk".

In addition to his work with the UNODC in changing the culture of policymakers, law enforcement and prosecutors in MENA region to reconsider the threat of cybercrime and the importance of digital evidence and cyber investigation as a tool to fight back.

Founded in 1754, the RSA aims to promote creativity across industry and develop collaborative networks to formulate innovative new ideas and help society flourish. Fellows of the Royal Society are elected by a panel of existing fellows who consider the nominee's merits, creativity and alignment with the society's ambitions. Fellows are permitted to use the post-nominal letters 'FRSA' and Mohamed El-Guindy joins a select group of around 30,000 fellows globally, including Tim Berners-Lee and Stephen Hawking; former fellows of the RSA include Karl Marx, Benjamin Franklin and Charles Dickens.



The RSA has been at the forefront of social change for over 260 years. Today their work focusses on supporting innovation in three major areas: creative learning and development, public services and communities, and economy, enterprise and manufacturing.

Mohamed has also been awarded as an Associate Fellow of the Higher Education Academy.

Technical Spotlight

Dr James Fox, Laboratory & York Tissue Bank Manager

#TechnicianJourney



James works at the University of York as a Laboratory and York Tissue Bank Manager.

What do you do at your institution?

My role is split 80% laboratory manager for two buildings (13 research groups) in which research is focussed in the areas of immunology, haematology and infection by staff and students from the <u>Department of Biology</u> and <u>Hull York Medical School</u>. My remaining 20% is as the <u>York Tissue</u> <u>Bank</u> Manager and person designate on the universities human tissue act licence. I'm also involved in our technician network, <u>TechYork</u>, and delivery of our universities pledge to the <u>Technicians Commitment</u>.

Why did you want to work as a Technician?

Being a technician is a fantastic job, I have an amazingly diverse role in which no two days are ever the same. I need to be responsive as and when issues arise but also strategic to consider the long-term goals of the department. I love research and problem solving and my role enables me to do this as well as train and manage staff, interact with students, maintain equipment and building infrastructure as well as facilitate regulator compliance utilising all my skills and experiences, whilst having some flexibility to take advantage of new training/upskilling or opportunities as they arise.

What makes your role so vital at your institution?

Within the buildings I manage, research is conducted on parasites classified as hazard group 2 / 3 organisms by the advisory committee on dangerous pathogens. As such, we have five containment level 3 laboratories that I manage to meet the health and safety executive's regulatory requirements. Similarly, there are strict regulatory requirements for storage of human samples under the human tissue act so I advise our researchers and facilitate access to human samples through the tissue bank whilst ensuring compliance with the regulatory authority.

What did you do before you became a Technician?

After completing a PhD and undertaking various post-doctoral, lab manager and technical roles at four different universities, I moved to my current position. The wealth of experience I gained previously working in different labs and at different institutes has been really useful in my current role.

What do you enjoy doing when you are not working?

We recently got a Parson Russell Terrier, Max, from our local <u>Jerry Green Dog Rescue</u> <u>centre</u> so my spare time is now filled with lots of dog walks!
